Greetings - The 2022-23 fiscal year was an awesome year for the RWC as we established ourselves as one of the cities' impactful organizations at our grand opening premier. It gives me great pleasure to report on the progress and impact of our first year in providing critical resources to the small business community. In a very short period, our vision and mission have grown bigger and faster than we could have ever imagined! Although we are intentional about our priority of women advancement, the RWC has unintentionally grown into a more community focused center, providing resources and services that extend from small business matters to financial and health wellness, resiliency, housing, and STEM education. We are ecstatic about the growth and impact that was made during this year.

In 2022 our year-one impact goals were successfully met. We served over 700 individuals through invaluable collaborations with federal, state, local, private, and non-profit resource partners. We expanded the 10,400-square ft innovation hub's capacity, that is now home to 6 new tenants. Upgrades to multiple training and conference rooms, a day workspace, and the community disaster recovery annex have supported programs in partnership with SBA, LED, Hancock Whitney, TruFund, Hope Credit Union, the American Red Cross and the American Heart Association. Through this expansion and increased capacity, we have focused on the implementation of critical community and small business resources.

This report highlights the impact and measures of progress through programs and participants served. As we look ahead, we are motivated to be intentional, innovative, and forward-thinking about initiatives that directly impact the growth of this underserved community of color.

The Reimagine Women's Center Business Resource and Innovation Hub was established in April 2022. Through private investments, the 10,400 square-foot facility was renovated and is now home to the RWC, a non-profit organization that offers a wide range of small business and community outreach services that target women entrepreneurs across the city of Baton Rouge and surrounding parishes.

The Co-Founders of the facility are a group of professional women who have leveraged their long-time experiences in various areas to extend additional resources to the small business community. While the RWC works across the board with state, federal, and local agencies as collaborative community stakeholders, the RWC is a self-funded non-profit entity.

The RWC was the first organization to recognize and answer the call of the unmet need for resources that specifically focuses on women, making it the Capital City's First Minority-Owned, Women-Led Innovation Hub. RWC relies on the voluntary services of its founders, board members, and individuals within the community to help with the operations of the non-profit.






# **Measuring Progress**





Bridget Bryant, the center's director of operations, has owned the facility since 2020 and originally envisioned it as a daycare.
